S&P 500 Nears Record

Gains Broaden

U.S. stocks extended gains last week as investors cheered Fed Chairman Powell's Jackson Hole speech on Friday signaling that the start of interest rate cuts is on the horizon. Together with the near 4% gain the week prior, the S&P 500 ended the week just 0.58% below its July 16 all-time closing high. Equity gains are broadening as small cap stocks have gained 6.6% over the past two weeks, while 70% of S&P 500 constituents ended above their 50-day moving averages versus 44% at the start of August.

For the Week...

The S&P 500 gained 1.47%, the Dow Jones Industrial Average rallied 1.29% and the tech-heavy Nasdaq Composite rose 1.41%. Comparatively, the small cap-focused Russell 2000 outperformed, up 3.62% to extend its year-to-date (YTD) gain to 10.41%.

Used Home Sales Climb

Existing home sales rose 1.3% last month, ending a four-month losing streak, but sales are still down by 2.5% from a year ago. The supply of used homes available for sale rose 0.8% from June, up a whopping 19.8% from a year ago. Meanwhile, the median used home sales price rose 4.2% to \$422,600, the 13th straight month of annualized gains, but eased from \$426,000 in June.

Weekly Sector Insights

Ten of the 11 sector groups posted gains last week with Energy (-0.28%) the only negative performer. Real Estate (+3.68%) gained the most followed by Materials (+2.39%) and Consumer Discretionary (+2.10%). Communication Services (+1.21%) and Technology (+1.08%) gained the least. The 2024 YTD sector leaderboard continues to be led by Technology (+29.05%), Communication Services (+23.97%) and Utilities (+21.13%). Materials (+9.38%) and Consumer Discretionary (+6.55%) have the smallest YTD gains.

Treasury Yields Decline

Following Fed Chairman Powell's September rate cut signaling, the yield on 10-year Treasury notes ended Friday at 3.804%, down over 0.08% for the week. The U.S. Dollar Index tumbled 1.7% for its fifth straight weekly decline. Gold futures edged higher to extend its record high to \$2,546.30/ounce. U.S. WTI crude oil futures ended the week at \$74.83/barrel, down from \$75.54 the week prior.



Chart of the Week: Homebuyer Demand Remains Low



Mortgage purchase applications fell 5.2% last week, with homebuyer demand dropping despite the 30-year mortgage rate hitting a 15-month low of 6.50%. Sub-6% rates may be needed to drive the housing sector out of a recession.

Glossary

The **Dow Jones Industrial Average** is a price-weighted average of 30 significant stocks traded on the New York Stock Exchange and the NASDAQ.

The **S&P 500** is an index of 500 stocks chosen for market size, liquidity and industry grouping (among other factors) designed to be a leading indicator of U.S. equities and is meant to reflect the risk/return characteristics of the large cap universe.

The NASDAQ Composite Index includes all domestic and international based common type stocks listed on The NASDAQ Stock Market. The NASDAQ Composite Index is a broad based index.

The **Russell 2000 Index** measures the performance of the small-cap segment of the U.S. equity universe and is a subset of the Russell 3000 Index representing approximately 10% of the total market capitalization of that index. It includes approximately 2000 of the smallest securities based on a combination of their market cap and current index membership.

The **Russell 3000 Index** measures the performance of the largest 3,000 U.S. companies representing approximately 98% of the investable U.S. equity market.

The **Russell Midcap Index** measures the performance of the mid-cap segment of the U.S. equity universe and is a subset of the Russell 1000 Index. It includes approximately 800 of the smallest securities based on a combination of their market cap and current index membership.

The **Bloomberg US Aggregate Bond Index**, which was originally called the Lehman Aggregate Bond Index, is a broad based flagship benchmark that measures the investment grade, US dollar-denominated, fixed-rate taxable bond market. The index includes Treasuries, government—related and corporate debt securities, MBS (agency fixed-rate and hybrid ARM pass-throughs), ABS and CMBS (agency and non-agency) debt securities that are rated at least Baa3 by Moody's and BBB- by S&P. Taxable municipals, including Build America bonds and a small amount of foreign bonds traded in U.S. markets are also included. Eligible bonds must have at least one year until final maturity, but in practice the index holdings have a fluctuating average life of around 8.25 years.

The **Bloomberg US Corporate High Yield Index** measures the USD-denominated, non-investment grade, fixed-rate, taxable corporate bond market. Securities are classified as high yield if the middle rating of Moody's, Fitch, and S&P is Ba1/BB+/BB+ or below, excluding emerging market debt. Payment-in-kind and bonds with predetermined step-up coupon provisions are also included. Eligible securities must have at least one year until final maturity, but in practice the index holdings has a fluctuating average life of around 6.3 years.

The **Bloomberg US Municipal Bond Index** covers the USD-denominated long-term tax exempt bond market. The index has four main sectors: state and local general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, insured bonds, and prerefunded bonds. Eligible securities must be rated investment grade (Baa3/BBB- or higher) by Moody's and S&P and have at least one year until final maturity.

The **MSCI EAFE** Index is designed to measure the equity market performance of developed markets (Europe, Australasia, Far East) excluding the U.S. and Canada. The Index is market-capitalization weighted.

The MSCI Emerging Markets Index is designed to measure equity market performance in global emerging markets. It is a float-adjusted market capitalization index.

The **Bloomberg Commodity Index** is a broadly diversified index that measures 22 exchange-traded futures on physical commodities in five groups (energy, agriculture, industrial metals, precious metals, and livestock), which are weighted to account for economic significance and market liquidity. No single commodity can comprise less than 2% or more than 15% of the index; and no group can represent more than 33% of the index.

The **S&P GSCI Crude Oil Index** is a sub-index of the S&P GSCI, provides investors with a reliable and publicly available benchmark for investment performance in the crude oil market.

The **S&P GSCI Gold Index**, a sub-index of the S&P GSCI, provides investors with a reliable and publicly available benchmark tracking the COMEX gold futures market.

The **U.S. Dollar Index** is a weighted geometric mean that provides a value measure of the United States dollar relative to a basket of major foreign currencies. The index, often carrying a USDX or DXY moniker, started in March 1973, beginning with a value of the U.S. Dollar Index at 100.000.
